6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

1. Organising seminars, workshops and extension lectures.
2. Deputation of faculty members for seminars and workshop.
3. Departments make academic calendar at the beginning of the academic session.
4. Using ICI enabled technology for teaching like – Interactive Board, or head projector, etc.
5. Old department conducts class test, group discussion, tutorials and assignments regularly.
6. Apart from this field trips, educational tours are also organised as per availability of the grounds.
7. Teacher shall their study material like articles, PPT's or web- links with the students.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

1. Periodic teach are taken by all the departments.
2. Class presentation through projectors and otherwise are held in every semester
3. Giving feedback on the assignment submitted by the students.
4. Continuous evaluation through class tests, seminars, project work and assignment are done for internal assessment purpose.
5. Registrar conduct ensures smooth conduct of examinations apart from organising EVS exams.
6. Practical examinations is conducted with help of internal and external examination appointed by the university every semester.
7. At percent 20% highest weightage given to internal evaluation and 80% weightage to external evaluation.
